




### From Kindergarten:

### First Grade News:

First Grade News- Students celebrated International Peace day on September 21st by making pinwheels for peace. Thank you to Mr. Thorner for displaying them in the Media Center. Our first in school field trip was a success with the Mag Lab Program learning and exploring magnets. What we're learning this month- Reading-Describing character, setting, events in a story using key details. Math-Developing and understanding using different strategies for addition and subtraction within 20. Social Studies- Learning that history tells the story of people and events of other times and places. Science-Technology all around us-understanding and applying scientific investigation, experimentation, and research using problem solving skills. Coming in November- Field trip to Richard G. Fallon Theater to watch "Pinkalicious Play" on November 16th.



### 2nd Grade

Our second graders are working hard to reach their AR (Accelerated Reading) goals for this quarter. AR tests must be taken at school, but they can prepare for the tests by reading at home. Encourage your child to read at least 20 minutes per night, preferably in an AR book they have chosen within their reading range. If you are unsure about your child's reading range, contact their teacher. You can check progress by going to the AR website on Class Link (Renaissance Learning). Your child may be bringing home books from the school or classroom library, but if you need additional books, the Woodville Community Library would be a great place to go. The librarian would be happy to help you find good AR books for your child to read. ### A view from 3rd Grade

We are so proud of the hard work and effort that we are seeing from our 3rd Graders! They have made gains in reading, improved their problem solving skills, learned to think like a scientist, and discovered important events and figures in American History. We have just begun our chapter on multiplication, and our students love it! Please take some time to practice times tables with your child. Flash Cards, math games, and discussing strategies together can help build multiplication fluency and help your child become more fluent. Conference forms have been sent home, and we have enjoyed meeting with our parents and families. If you have not yet met with your child's teacher, please get in touch to set up a meeting.



### 4th Grade

This school year is off to a great start! We have had opportunities for growth and have really had a chance to get to know each student. A major focus this nine weeks has been making sure that 4th grade is meeting AR goals. Reading is very important for keeping the brain acclimated for learning and helps with boosting understanding of ELA and math concepts. In addition

to AR being a major focus we are focusing heavily on boosting their multiplication fluency. Multiplication is a huge factor when it comes to understanding much of the future lessons we'll be covering in GoMath! This first nine weeks has paved the way for a smooth and productive school year.

### 5th Grade

The first nine-weeks is quickly coming to an end and we are in the process of scheduling and holding conferences. Conferences are important to ensure that the students, teachers, and parents are doing all that can be done to ensure the child's success.



Reading is vital to a student's educational success. Students are given Accelerated Reading goals every nine weeks. Make it a point to ask them how they are progressing on their AR goal. Students are expected to read 20-30 minutes a day. Additionally, they are required to complete their reading log daily and this should be turned in weekly as part of their homework.

In Science, students are starting the unit on Earth and Space. Science notes are in the student's binders for them to review and study. Please ask your student if they can explain the concepts they are learning about.

Math is a subject that develops through building concepts one upon another. Students are learning how to divide with whole numbers and decimals. If they have not mastered the multiplication tables, it is difficult to understand the division concept. Parents, please be sure to look over your child's math homework to ensure they are being successful.

Students can access all of their textbooks on line through class links on the Leon County School website. There are also other resources there to provide support for their core subjects.

It is important that students come to school prepared to learn. They need to have their binder with their notebooks, agenda, pencil, and headphones in their backpack every day.
