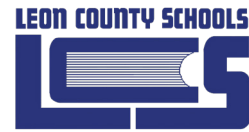

Letter from the Past Chair and Superintendent



Dear Community Members—

At the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year there was a sense of excitement, but also uncertainty. We were looking forward to having all of our students back In Class, since it is our belief (along with proven research) that students learn best in an in-person, or 'in class' environment. Additionally, for many students, particularly those who were school-based Digital Academy students, this would be the first time that they were returning to brick-and-mortar schools and classrooms since March of 2020. However, uncertainty remained as the COVID-19 pandemic was still a prevalent and deterring factor for the overall health of the community.

There was also the indeterminate aspect to the level of student learning loss, and other impacts the pandemic had made, and could still make on a student's education, attendance, and overall well-being. In addition, we realized there would be a toll that the pandemic would have had on our teachers, school and district staff as well, and how to best support them in their efforts to adapt to the changing complexities of education during a pandemic, and what new challenges they might be facing as the school year started.

Along with that came the ever-changing aspect to COVID-19 protocols and communicating those fluctuating changes to students and families. These past two years have taught us a lot, with one of those primary tenets being that our students' and employees' health and safety is, and will remain, our number one priority, and that effectively communicating with our district and school communities is paramount.

We started our year off with those main goals in mind and set safety and wellness plans in motion on day one, and shared all information on our In Class website and updated it regularly, along with sharing updates on all of our communication channels. First, we gave our teachers extra planning time to prepare for the school year. Then, once school started, our district support staff, schools, and educators spent time assessing students' academic state of being, but also how our students were feeling and connecting them with extra support services for academics, and/or mental health as needed. We expanded our partnerships with mental health providers, and implemented an online tutoring component, along with at-school assistance. Additionally, we were able to provide free meals to all students for the entire school year and continued our 1:1 Chromebook initiative.

As the year progressed, we moved more into a sense of normalcy, but still maintained a vigilance of health and safety as we continued to monitor student progress and provide supports for both students, families, and employees. Many of our in-person events continued to be held online, but we were able to resume graduations at the Donald J. Tucker Civic Center for the first time in two years. We celebrated the amazing accomplishments of our Class of 2022 seniors, but also the district's success as a whole.

It is with great pride that we present the 2021-2022 In Class Annual Report as a reflection of the incredible ways our district navigated unprecedented times in order to empower our students and advance our mission and vision for Leon County Schools.

We appreciate the community's support in these efforts to help all of our children succeed both In Class and in the future.

Integrity & Ethical Responsibility. LCS requires the highest level of integrity and personal responsibility for all stakeholders.

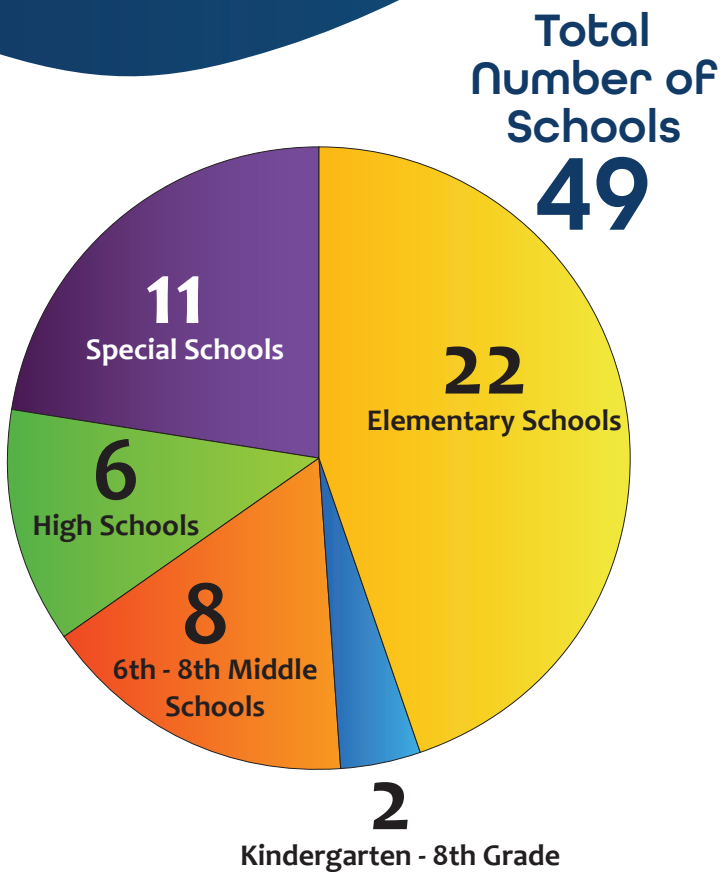

- Continuing to enhance our school safety analyst positions: they help with social media monitoring related to threats to our schools, student / individual self-harm.
- COVID-19 Protocols and Response: the In Class website shared the COVID-19 protocols and decision trees for treating, monitoring, and reporting. The website also housed COVID-19 testing and vaccination information, along with how schools and offices were continuing to clean and disinfect the environments.

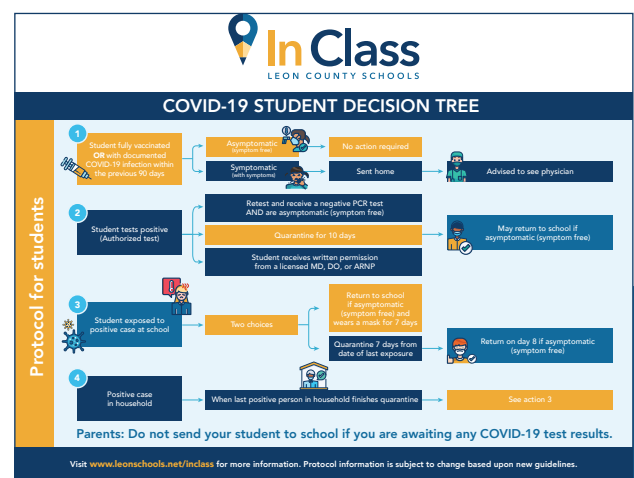

LCS, in conjunction with vendors and local partnerships, offered free testing sites for students and employees.



Social/Emotional Well-Being and Mental Health



- Expanded school-based mental health care services using the mental health assistance to directly employ school psychologists, school social workers, school counselors, and licensed mental health professionals.
- Trained educators and other school staff in Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA), Suicide and Threat Risk assessment, and trauma informed practices to detect and respond to mental health issues.
- Connected children, youth and families who may experience mental and behavioral health issues with appropriate services by contracting services and establishing interagency agreements with community-based mental health providers.
 - Contracted Services with community-based partners (DISC Village, Inc.) to provide nine (9) specialists to implement evidence based mental health programs and provide support to elementary schools.
 - Interagency agreement with DISC Village, Inc. to add two (2) mental health counselors and seventeen (17) Health and Wellness Specialists to focus on delivering evidence-based mental health care treatment to students in secondary schools.
 - Interagency agreements and collaborative efforts or partnerships with community mental health programs, agencies, or providers to provide additional mental health, social/emotional behavior, and substance abuse support upon parent initiation or school referrals.
- Provided Prevention Education for Students
 - PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports)
 - Life skills that build confidence, support mental and emotional health, and enable students to overcome challenges.

Improve communication and collaboration with all LCS stakeholders.

- Launched the LCS Office of Admissions to create a centralized enrollment system.
- Created an In Class website to keep the district informed about safety protocols, mental health and wellness services that included COVID-19 testing sites, and academic support, such as online tutoring.
- Switched the entire district over to a new, more mobile-friendlier, and ADA accessible website template.
- Implemented Peachjar, a digital flyer management system which provides a greater email reach, marketing analytics, and has helped the district save over 4 million sheets of paper and 450 trees since its launch.
- Returned to indoor graduation ceremonies at the Donald J. Tucker Civic Center—LCS Gradstars.
- Increased community involvement throughout LCS.
- Volunteers and mentors sustained a high level of virtual involvement that then became more in-person based as the school-year progressed.



Reconnected to Comcast and launched the 1095 TV channel which streams online from the district website on any device whether or not someone has cable at home.

The golf scramble was held on May 17, 2021 at Golden Eagle Country Club. Thanks to support of sponsors and participants we raised almost \$30,000.



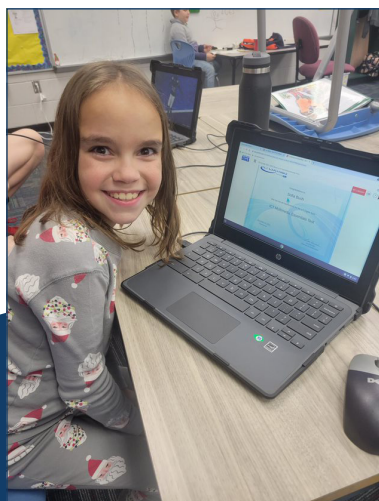

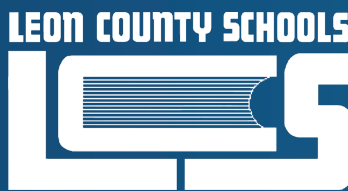
