Touching and powerful, each poem is both accessible and emotionally charged, each line a glimpse into a child's soul as she searches for her place in the world. Woodson's eloquent poetry also reflects the joy of finding her voice through writing stories, despite the fact that she struggled with reading as a child. Assignment

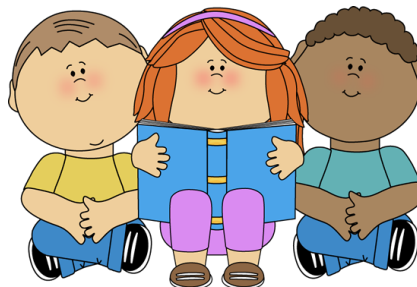
1. Read the book from your assigned grade level (your grade for the 2019-2020 school year).

- Create a movie poster for the book. Include a catchy slogan, an illustration that captures the main message of the book, and who would be playing the main characters.

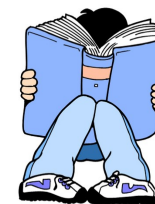
