Congratulations to **Chaires Elementary** (formerly Janeen Larson, now Delanie Ornstein); **Montford Middle School** (Stacy Thompson); and **Sabal Palm Elementary** (Cheryl Frazier).

This award is bestowed by FASM (the Florida Association of Supervisors of Media). A lengthy presentation, survey of both faculty and students, along with interviews of school administration are the main components. One of the unique aspects of this award is that it belongs to the school, not the media specialist. That is because an award-winning school library is not only the media specialist's responsibility--it is everyone's.





LCS po2522.01

This is the policy that directs how to handle 'Objections to Materials Used in Classrooms, Made Available in a School or Classroom Library, or Included on a Reading List'

It establishes a process to follow and if the objector is not satisfied after speaking with the school principal, a committee is tasked with reviewing the materials and making a determination.

The committee is to consist of but is not limited to:

- 1. one (1) or more parents of students who will have access to the materials;
- 2. one (1) or more instructional staff members;
- 3. one (1) or more certified media specialist;
- 4. one (1) or more lay persons knowledgeable in the area.

Meetings of review committees must be noticed and open to the public in accordance with F.S. 286.011.

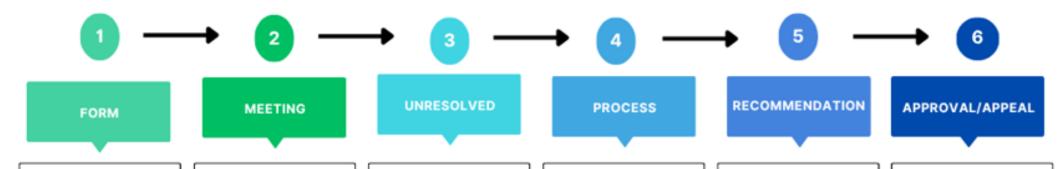




Each Step is Clearly Outlined

LCS Objection Process of a Specific Instructional Material

(in a classroom, made available in a school library, or included on a reading list based on the criteria set forth in F.S. 1006.28(2)(a)2. or F.S. 1014.05(1)(c). **LCS po 2522.01**



Download and complete the LCS Specific Material Objection Form. Submit to school principal.

The principal will schedule a meeting with the objector within 10 days of receipt of the form. If unresolved, the principal forwards he issue cannot be resolved, the principal forwards the objection form and evidence provided to Asst. Superintendent of Academic Services.

If the Superintendent approves, the Asst. Superintendent will appoint a commitee to evaluate the material in publicly noticed meetings.

The review

recommendation will
hearing officer will be
reported to the
superintendent within
30 days following the
formation of the
committee.

Upon the approval of the Superintendent, the Asst. Superintendent of Academic Services shall inform the objector of the committee's recommendation.
