

STEP#3: UNDERSTAND PROMOTION AND RECOVERY



- To be a sophomore (10th) → 5 credits and a 1.0 GPA
- To be a junior (11th) → 10 credits and 1.5 GPA
- To be a senior (12th) → 17 credits and 2.0 GPA
- If a student needs to make up credits or improve GPA
 - Adult and Community Education (ACE)
 - Leon County Virtual School (LCVS)
 - Florida Virtual School (flvs.net)
- Only students who have received a D or F may retake the same course. Student must earn a C or better to replace the grade in the cumulative GPA.



DUAL ENROLLMENT VS. ADVANCED PLACEMENT

Dual Enrollment

- Limited to students with a 3.0 unweighted gpa (3.9 weighted for FSU) and qualifying test scores.
- Specific course limitations determined by each institute

Dual Enrollment Benefits

- No cost to the student
- Automatic college credit upon successful completion of the course
- Variety of courses and locations
- Courses can be taken in any semester
- High school and college credit awarded for each semester
- In some cases, a course may earn 1.0 high school credit for a semester course
- For State University System admission, grade will be weighted 1.0 in most cases

Dual Enrollment Risks

- Grade counts on your college transcript and starts your college GPA
- Not as well respected nationally by college admissions departments
- College attendance and drop/add policies are strictly enforced
- Counselor and parent communication may be limited by college restrictions
- Withdrawing after drop/add will only be granted under extreme circumstances and could negatively impact college admission and financial aid

Advanced Placement Enrollment

- Based on willingness to challenge yourself academically and teacher/counselor recommendation
- Specific course limitations vary by course

Advanced Placement Benefits

- No cost to the student
- Respected nationally and internationally as the most rigorous courses in each subject area
- The best possible college preparation for a four-year university
- Variety of courses (more than 25 different courses available)
- Enrollment based on willingness to challenge yourself academically
- For State University System admission, grade will be weighted 1.0
- AP Capstone Diploma option
- Classes are held on Lincoln's campus

Advanced Placement Risks

- To earn college credit, you must score a 3 or higher on the exam
- College credit will not be awarded until July
- Courses taken during the first semester, such as American Government or Economics, are concluded well in advance of the AP exam
- College credit is determined by each individual institute
- Withdrawing from the course could negatively impact college admission

DCT/OJT PROGRAM and EXTERNSHIP PROGRAM



DCT On-the-Job-Training PROGRAM

- 2.5 GPA
- Must be employed prior to start of school
- Job site must be approved
- Application required
- Must have transportation
- Must work 5 hours for every period of DCT



EXTERNSHIP PROGRAM

- 3.0 or higher unweighted GPA
- have taken at least 2 AP classes
- enroll in minimum of 1 AP classes in 12th grade
- Application required
- Have transportation
- Must spend 8 hours per week with sponsor

DUAL ENROLLMENT: Florida State University

INITIAL ELIGIBILITY: Spring 2026

- 3.9 weighted high school GPA on a minimum of 12 academic credits (see specific requirements)
- AND the following standardized test scores and subscores:
 - ACT: 26+ Composite (Reading 19+, English 19+, Math 21+)
 - SAT: 1230+ total Score (Reading 24.5+, Writing 27.5+, Math 25.5+)
- Student is ineligible if any HS semester grade is below a "C".



DUAL ENROLLMENT: Lively Technical College

INITIAL ELIGIBILITY: Fall 2025*

Enroll in **Lively Technical College** (LTC) postsecondary courses creditable toward both high school graduation and a career and technical program certificate.

- 2.0 unweighted cumulative GPA
- Completed a minimum of 11 credits
- Students 16 years old & older

DEADLINE FOR REGISTRATION PAPERWORK:

See your counselor now through May 20th.

DUAL ENROLLMENT: Florida Agricultural And Mechanical University

INITIAL ELIGIBILITY: Fall 2025*

- Attend mandatory meeting 4/1 or 4/2
- 3.0 unweighted high school GPA
- Be classified as a high school junior or senior – or meet with counselor
- Qualifying test scores:
 - ACT: Reading 19+, English (Writing) 17+, Math 19+ or higher for MAC 1105 (@21+))
 - SAT: Reading 24+, Writing 25+, Math 24+ or higher for MAC 1105 (@ 25.5+)
 - PERT: 106+ Reading, 103+ Writing, 114 Math (123 for MAC 1105)

* Criterial subject to legislative change.

DUAL ENROLLMENT: Tallahassee State College

- AND Qualifying test scores (may be combined):
 - ACT: Reading 19+, English (Writing) 17+, Math 19+ or higher for MAC 1105 (@21+))
 - SAT: Reading 24+, Writing 25+, Math 24+ or higher for MAC 1105 (@ 25.5+)
 - PERT: 106+ Reading, 103+ Writing, 114+ Math (123 for MAC 1105)

* *Criteria subject to legislative change.*

STEP#5

CONSIDER ACT, CLT, & SAT

- Scores are required for university admissions and Bright Futures.
- Scores can be used for placement at community colleges and technical schools.
- Scores may meet FAST ELA and ALG 1 EOC concordant requirements for high school graduation.

TEST PREPARATION

- **The best preparation is a solid high school curriculum.**
- **Become familiar with the test content and format**
 - ACT/CLT/SAT Websites
 - Practice Tests
 - Khan Academy
- **Get plenty of rest the night before.**

 - **Bring Admissions Ticket, Photo ID, Calculator, Pencil and Watch – not a Smartwatch**

How Do I Decide?

Examples of questions to ask yourself and/or to research so that you have the information needed to support good decision-making.

SELF-KNOWLEDGE:

- What are your interests, favorite subjects, hobbies, skills or areas of expertise?
- Do you and/or your family value reaching a particular level of post-secondary education? If so, what?

EDUCATION/OCCUPATIONAL KNOWLEDGE:

- What careers/professions do you want to know more about?
- What education/training options do my career options require?
- What is the typical academic profile needed to meet admissions requirements?
- What are the costs of each education/training option?

BUILD MY PROSPECT LIST



Consider 3 to 8 Options

Select schools that meet your academic profile, have the career field(s) or major(s) of interest, preferred location or community type, campus size, offer financial resources, opportunities for service learning or obtaining industry experience, etc.

What is important to you?

REACH SCHOOLS

Include two schools that are slightly of reach in one or more areas including academic profile, cost or location.

TARGET SCHOOLS

Include three schools where the requirements match your academic requirements and resources.

SAFETY SCHOOL

Include at least one school where your academic profile exceeds admissions requirements and/or are minimal compared to other options.



PRO TIPS:

- **Visit the campus.**
- Participate in Guidance presentations.
- Talk with alumni.
- Find out how many freshman return after the first year.
- Check out employment placement rates.

PREPARE FOR ADMISSIONS PROCESS



Know Your Application Type & Deadlines

Schools give students options for how to apply.

Some application types may require more information from the students, teachers and guidance counselors than institutional applications.

Apply as early as possible.

INSTITUTIONAL ONLINE APPLICATION

Applying direct to the school through their own online application.

MULTI-SCHOOL APPLICATION PLATFORMS

Third-party application that allows for students to apply to more than one school with a single application. Typically a more extensive application requiring support from both teachers and guidance counselors. Students applying to schools requiring the self-reported academic record (SSAR/SPARK) will still need to complete this in addition to the third-party application.

Students using the Common App or the CBCA should see their guidance counselor as soon as possible to ask for counselor support.

STEP #6

PREPARE FOR ADMISSIONS PROCESS



Ready. Set. Apply Early!

Visit your prospective schools admissions website for the latest requirements & deadlines.

Schedule time to gather all required documents and to complete applications as early as possible.

Track your own application progress!

UNOFFICIAL & OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS

Go to the Lincoln website, select “Students” and then “Transcript Requests” for step-by-step instructions on how to request either an unofficial or official transcript.

SELF-REPORTED ACADEMIC RECORD (SSAR)

The SSAR (or SPARK for UCF) replaces the high school transcript in the application process. Use the Lincoln unofficial transcript when creating the SSAR so that the information submitted is complete and accurate. Submission deadlines apply!

TEACHER / COUNSELOR RECOMMENDATIONS

Applications may require support from both teachers and guidance counselors. Students must make sure to ask recommenders ahead of time, provide any needed information and give plenty of notice prior to any recommendation deadline.



PRO TIP:

Guidance counselors ask for a completed Guidance Recommendation Request packet at least **three weeks** prior to any **deadline!**

APPLICATION FEES

Application fees (or provide documentation of fee waiver eligibility) are required per school.

ACT/SAT TEST SCORES

Request official test scores to be sent to each school, if the school was not listed when initially registering for the ACT/SAT. Fees may apply. Note deadlines for test scores.

RESIDENCY STATUS

COLLEGE ESSAY

Check prospective schools for requirements and prompts.
