Please be <u>specific</u> with your answers to ensure that you will be able to respond to the writing prompt. Responses should be written/typed on another sheet of paper.

- Describe the protagonist or main character. How did the character change or progress from the beginning to the end of the book? (Be specific about appearance, age, name, personality qualities, or character traits. To gather clues about a character's personality, notice a character's words, actions, reactions, feelings, movements, thoughts, mannerisms, and of what others say about the character.)
- 2. Describe the conflict or central problem. How was the conflict solved? Remember that a conflict can be a problem that the character has within him.
- 3. List at least <u>five</u> important events from the book in chronological order. Be sure to include events from the beginning, middle, and end of the book.
- 4. a. Briefly describe a life lesson that can be learned from this novel.
 b. Choose a key passage that offers clues to the novel's life lesson.
 c. Write the passage word for word. (This passage should be at least one paragraph.)
 Include the page number where you found this passage in the book.
 d. Explain why you selected this passage as an example of the life lesson.
