



COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT PLAN CYCLE

This collection development plan is a subsection of the Lawton Chiles High School Strategic Plan for Library Media Operations. The collection development plan outlines how district and school funds are to be spent, collection maintenance, and how/when to remove items from the collection. The Lawton Chiles High School Collection Development Plan is organized as follows:



KNOWLEDGE OF THE COMMUNITY

Lawton Chiles High School serves 1,900 students enrolled in grades 9-12. The student population's ethnicity is made of 157 (8.4%) Hispanic and 1,496 (79.7%) Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 1,339 White (71.3%)%, 157 Black (8.4%) 12 Native (0.6%), 141 Asian/Pacific Islander (7.5%), and 73 Multicultural (3.9%) students.

The administration includes Principal Joseph Burgess, and Assistant Principals Grace Bigelow, Paul Lambert, Dan Molinaro, and Calli Pickens. Lawton Chiles High School is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities to excel academically and through extracurriculars. These include nearly 25 athletic groups including football, basketball, soccer, track and field, lacrosse, flag football, swimming, dance and cheerleading. Chiles also has over 40 clubs, both academic and community-oriented. Academic clubs include National Honor Society, Mu Alpha Theta, English National Honor Society, National Art Honor Society, Brain Bowl, International Thespian Society, Chorus, Band and WolfCenter. Community-oriented clubs include Anchor, Key, and FCA.

KNOWLEDGE OF COLLECTION

Collection Analysis

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Lawton Chiles High School indicates that the average age of the collection is 2006 and the number of books per student is 5.4. The American Association for School Libraries has established a criterion for highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Lawton Chiles High School does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student. The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis.

Collection Analysis by Category

The information collected in this section provides a detailed look at the current library collection by classification and genre. The information was gathered from Follett Destiny, the library management system, and Titlewave, the vendor's ordering and analysis tool.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns

- Concerns Non-fiction books are outdated
- Strengths There is an appropriate ratio of fiction to non-fiction books.

Representation Analysis

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Results

Based on the available school data of Lawton Chiles High School in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:

Summary

After completing a deeper, targeted analysis of the representation section of the TitleWise report, it was determined that:

 The current collection is lacking in books that represent our minority populations. A priority will now be to add books that help to fill this deficit.

Needs Assessment

Online surveys were made available to teachers and staff May-July 2024. They received an
email with the survey and email reminders to complete their surveys. A total of 30 surveys
were completed. The surveys expressed a need for communication, updated non-fiction titles,
and access to online books and resources. These developed into the goals: 1. Weed and
update non-fiction collection, 2. Cultivate and support communication with teachers and
students about the books and resources that are available to them, 3. Provide access to online
resources available for teachers and students

Materials Selection

Lawton Chiles High School library media center is under the umbrella of the Leon County Schools district library program which in turn, follows requirements laid out by Florida law for library media centers and instructional materials.

Per <u>FS 1006.28.6(d)2.a-d</u> and LCS <u>po2520</u>, the guidelines below are general standards by which to review and select materials to meet the needs of LCS students, faculty, and staff.

Materials considered for purchase are selected on the basis of the following criteria. The materials must be:

Effort should be made to keep the media current, comprehensive, and include media that reflects rapidly developing instructional technologies.

After analyzing the Lawton Chiles High School library media collection, the following areas have been selected as the primary areas of emphasis for materials selection for the 2024-2025 school year.

Area 1: Non-fiction books. The current non-fiction collection needs books that are up-to-date and representative of current information and topics.

Area 2: Fiction and non-fiction books that are representative of our entire student population.

Acquisition, Processing, and Maintenance

Acquisitions Procedures in School Libraries

Because Leon County Schools school library media centers have only one school library media specialist, that individual is responsible for creating a collection to support instruction, literacy, and students' recreational reading. Materials selection policies generally mandate that the library professional seek input from teachers, other professional staff, and students. School library media specialists are also responsible for weeding or de-selecting collection materials following policy guidelines as well as making a decision as to whether gift items will be accepted.

Example: School Library Acquisitions Procedures

- In selecting learning resources, professional personnel will evaluate available resources and curriculum needs and will consult reputable, professionally prepared aids to selection, and other appropriate sources. The actual resource will be examined whenever possible.
- Recommendations for purchase involve administrators, teachers, students, district personnel, and community members, as appropriate.
- Gift materials shall be judged by the selection criteria and shall be accepted or rejected by those criteria.
- Selection is an ongoing process that should include removing materials that are no longer used or needed, adding materials, and replacing lost and worn materials that still have educational value.

Circulation

Circulation guidelines and procedures for Lawton Chiles High School:

- Students are able to access the library from 7:00 am 2:30 pm; they can come before/after school, or during a class time, if allowed by their teacher. Once students select their books, they see the media specialist to check out. There is not a limit for the number of books that students are able to check out at once, however, if they have a book that is overdue they are reminded that it must be turned in or they could be charged for the cost of a lost book.
- When books are returned, there are student media aides each class period who assist with shelving books.
- For lost books, students are ask to pay the cost of the book, or to bring in a replacement of the same book.
