Assessment Limits: Items may ask about how the author develops a point of view or purpose in the text. Items may ask about one or more viewpoints. Items may ask about the author's word choice or use of figurative language. Items may ask about the tone or mood of the author or text. Items may ask about a lack of textual evidence or about inappropriate or unsound evidence.
