8453.03 - HANDLING OF SKIN INFECTIONS

Purpose

Common skin infections can be serious if not treated properly. Any open wound may contain bacteria that could pose a public health threat. For the protection of all students, the District has developed the following guidelines and procedures that describe symptoms and treatment of skin infections, when to talk to a health care provider, exclusion criteria, and steps for prevention.

Procedures

- A. HOW SKIN INFECTIONS ARE SPREAD
 - Touching infected skin.
 - 2. Touching surfaces that have been contaminated with bacteria or organisms that cause infection.
 - Sharing sports equipment on the field, gym, or training room.
 - Sharing personal hygiene items that have been touched by other people (bar soap, towels, washcloths).
 - 5. Unavailability of resources for personal hygiene.
 - 6. Some skin infections don't spread from person to person. They start when normally present bacteria, viruses, or fungi get into a cut, scrape or other break in the skin.

B. EXCLUSION FOR SUSPECTED SKIN INFECTIONS

- 1. Only a licensed health care provider can determine the best treatment for skin infections.
- Any teacher or staff member should refer any student with a suspected skin infection that is spreading, getting worse, or does not appear to be healing. Symptoms of a skin infection may include:
 - warmth, tenderness, pain, redness, swelling, itchiness, and drainage of pus or other discharge;
 - an infection -- painful, swollen pimples, boils and rashes, for example -- can occur at
 the site of a cut, scratch, abrasion or other rash, or where there is no obvious break in
 the skin;

- other descriptions may include: "spider bite," "bug bite," abscess or boil, impetigo, or infected turf burn.
- The school health assistant, under the direction of the school nurse, will contact the parent regarding the need for attention to the wound and possible follow-up with a health care provider.

C. READMITTANCE CRITERIA

- 1. The student may return to school provided the wound can be covered and contained with a clean, dry dressing, taped on all four (4) sides.
- At the discretion of the school nurse, a note from a health care provider may be required stating the student is safe to return to school.

D. SPECIAL EXCLUSION CIRCUMSTANCES

- Any student with wound drainage that cannot be covered and contained with a clean, dry dressing taped on all four (4) sides.
- 2. Students who cannot maintain personal hygiene.
- Athletics/Physical Education: Students with active skin infections should not participate in contact sports until written medical clearance is obtained.

E. INFECTION CONTROL

- 1. Maintain good wound and skin care by keeping the area clean and dry, washing your hands after caring for the area, and carefully disposing of any bandages.
- All direct care items and potentially contaminated surfaces should be cleaned and disinfected with District approved cleaning agent.
- Notify the parent/guardian of any immune-compromised student that there is a diagnosed MRSA case in the immediate classroom. Strict confidentiality must be maintained (no names are released).
- 4. If a cluster or "outbreak" of skin infections occurs (three (3) or more cases within a classroom or specific group), the school will notify Health Services and District leadership to determine if the Leon County Health Department should be contacted for consultation.

F. PREVENTION

- 1. Wash hands often with warm, soapy water. Dry hands with disposable paper towels.
- Use alcohol-based hand sanitizer when soap and water are not available (supervise students).
- 3. Avoid contact with other people's skin infections (use Universal Precautions).

- 4. Keep cuts, abrasions, burns and scrapes clean and covered with a bandage until they have healed. Watch carefully for any signs of infection.
- Avoid sharing personal items, such as towels, washcloths, toothbrushes and razors.
- Clean potentially contaminated surfaces carefully with District-approved cleaning agents. All cleaning should be done on a regular schedule. Particular attention must be paid to desks, keyboards, phones, doorknobs, and light switches.

G. SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS IN SPORTS/PHYSICAL EDUCATION SETTINGS

- Cover all wounds. If a wound cannot be covered adequately, exclude from practice or competition.
- 2. Encourage good hygiene, including showering and washing with soap after each practice and competition.
- 3. Do not share towels or personal items, such as clothing or equipment.
- 4. Use a barrier (towel or layer of clothing) between the skin and shared equipment, as well as surfaces such as benches.
- 5. Establish routine disinfectant cleaning of shared surfaces such as wrestling mats, benches, weight room equipment, and shower and locker room areas.
- 6. Wash athletic clothing after each use.
- Athletes should report skin lesions to coaches/trainers for evaluation and report findings to school nurse.
- 8. All athletes and their parents should be informed by coaches/athletic directors of infection control precautionary measures, such as the importance of hand washing, showering immediately after sports activities, and washing practice clothes/uniforms after they are worn once.
