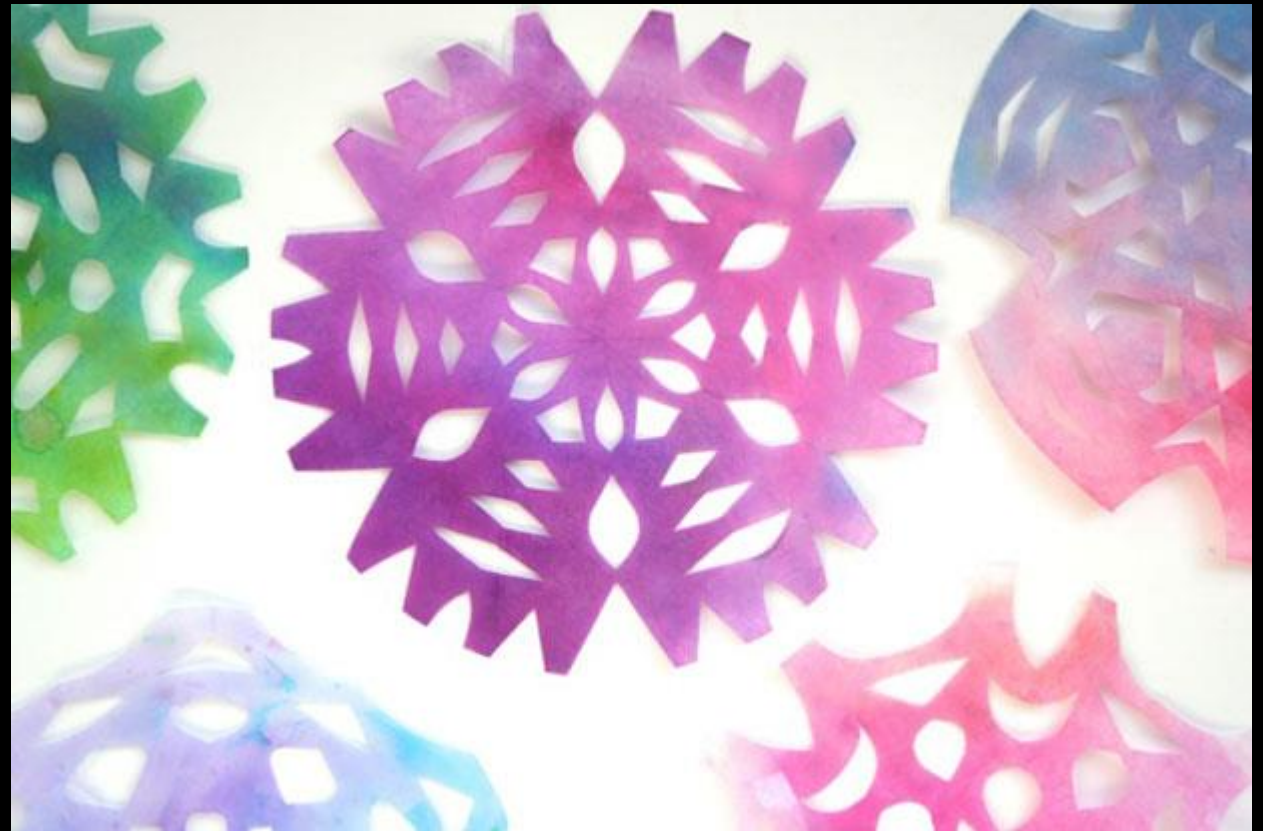
SNOWFLAKE BENTLEY
