

An Elephant's Excellent Trunk



Everything about an elephant is big. It has big ears. It has big eyes and big tusks. It can weigh as much as a school bus!

An elephant also has a long trunk. It uses its trunk to breathe and to smell. It uses its trunk to find leaves and fruits to eat. An elephant can shower itself with its trunk. It sucks up water and sprays its back.

A mother elephant can hold her baby close with her trunk. She can even use her trunk to help lift her baby or move it away from trouble. For example, she might use her trunk to save her baby from getting stuck in mud!

spray: The Spanish word spray means spray.

- 1. Have a grown-up spray your skin with child-safe bug spray.
- 2. If a fire starts, firefighters help us. They rush to the fire in fire engines. They spray water with big hoses. The water helps put out the fire.

tusk tusk

reciclar. The Spanish word reciclar means recycle.

- 1. Things made of plastic can be recycled. They can be made into something new.
- 2. Cans, bottles, and newspapers can be **recycled**. That means these objects are put through a special process so they can be used again.
- 3. Today many people **recycle** paper. When used paper is recycled, it is turned into new paper. Less paper is put in the trash. Fewer trees are cut down. Recycling is helpful to Earth!


If I had a wish for water, everyone would use it with care. Water is such a precious gift. We all must learn to share.







He'd turn all the water off while he gargles, sings, and brushes.





