Adjectives

An **adjective** is a word that describes people, places, or things. It adds to or clarifies the meaning of nouns and pronouns. Think of an adjective as a word that answers *what kind, how many,* or *which one.*

- **Descriptive:** Adjectives often appear before the noun or words they modify: a <u>funny</u> movie (answers the question, What kind of movie?)
- Predicate: Adjectives can also appear after the noun or pronoun they modify and after a linking verb. These are called predicate adjectives: The movie is <u>funny</u>.
- Nouns as Adjectives: Adjectives can also take the form of words we think of as nouns. In such cases, they appear before the words they modify: *the <u>bicycle</u> shop*
