<p>Main Topics (What main ideas/concepts will be covered?):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> I spend the first couple of weeks, how laws are a part of daily life. I do the same with movies that apply to what the students are learning. 	<p>Written (Terms, questions, outlines, free response, etc):</p> <p>I try and make sure there is no outside work (the only time this has happened is when we do projects.). Legal Studies being an elective, I try to schedule enough time to get things done in class, because I know students tend to have a lot of homework in their core classes.</p>
