Pre-K News

We are having a BLAST in Pre-K so far this year!!! We have spent the latter portion of last month in our Insect Study. We have investigated topics such as: what are the characteristics of insects, where do insects live, what insects live in our community and who works with insects. We learned new vocabulary words, such as predator, probiscis, mandible, migrate and metamorphosis. We have enjoyed many stories, such as Under the Lemon Moon, Bravo, Chico Canta! Bravo! and The Grouchy Ladybug.

The children have settled into all the rules and routines of the classroom and school and their learning progression shows that.

One of our main goals is to help your child become more independent and gain confidence. As cooler weather approaches, they have an opportunity to practice independence with their jacket. Upon entering the classroom your child can independently take off their jacket, hang up their jacket in their cubby, put it on when leaving the classroom and even correcting it if it's inside out. 1st Grade

Wow, it is already November! This year is moving by very quickly!

First graders have been working hard on addition and subtraction strategies, phonics, and comprehension skills. They have moved on from sounding out short three-letter CVC words to 4-5 letter words with blends.

Please continue to work on the homework packets that your child brings home and read every night to reinforce comprehension skills. Questions that you can ask while reading with your child include: Who are the characters? Where is this story taking place (setting)? What are the characters doing? Have the characters changed through the story? What is the main idea (if it is a nonfiction text)?

First grade teachers are requesting that parents check the agendas every night for important papers or messages from the teacher. Often times behavior is documented, or a note about homework. Please look over the homework before submitting it on the due date to make sure it is completed.

Kindergarten

Can you believe the first nine weeks is over? The students have learned so much! Your child's teacher will be contacting you to schedule a parent/teacher conference to discuss your student's progress. Starting the second nine weeks, students will be receiving letter grades in Focus and will be receiving progress reports and report cards each nine weeks. Please remember to regularly log in to Focus to keep track of your child's progress.

Let's also remember the importance of coming to school regularly and on time. Math begins promptly at 8:30am, so when your child is late or absent, they are missing important instructional time. We want to make sure that students excel in all subject areas. In addition, please ensure that students have jackets in their backpacks, an extra set of clothes, and that they are turning in their daily folder every day. Remember to look for homework, and please ensure your child has it ready to turn in when it is due.

In reading, we have just completed Unit 1: Going Places and will begin Unit 2: Living Together. Progress Check-ups are given at the end of the week's lessons. They have 4 sections: sight words, phonics, listening comprehension, and writing. It is important to review and practice the week's sight words and letter sounds with your child at home to better prepare them for this assessment.

In math, we have learned about the numbers 0-5 and comparing groups of objects (same, greater than, less than). We will begin learning about numbers 6-10. Please have your child practice writing numbers 0-10; review the number words- zero, one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, and ten; and review the concepts of groups having the same, greater than/more, and less than/fewer.

Math Facts Contests in Full Swing! At Ruediger, we are all about the FACTS! Each of our 1st through 5th graders were given a set of addition or multiplication drill cards at the beginning of the year. These aren't just flash cards, they're RAINBOW Flash Cards. Each color represents a different addition or multiplication strategy. In order to be successful in math tasks involving addition, subtraction, multiplication, division and even fractions... student must know their facts! Eventually these facts will be memorized, but that doesn't happen overnight. Until the facts are memorized, we have these strategies to fall back on. Ask an Intermediate student about the Twins strategy, Double It Double It, or Back Up & Add to 9. Our Primary students are just starting to learn their addition strategies. They'll be using strategies like Ten Friends, Counting On and Doubles. In order to encourage everyone to practice their facts we will be having periodic <u>Math Fact Contests</u> throughout the year.
