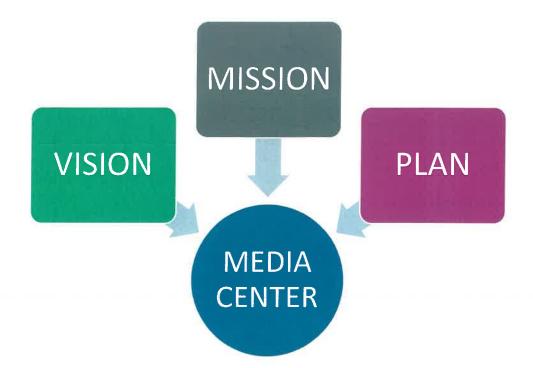
J. Michael Conley Elementary School Vision

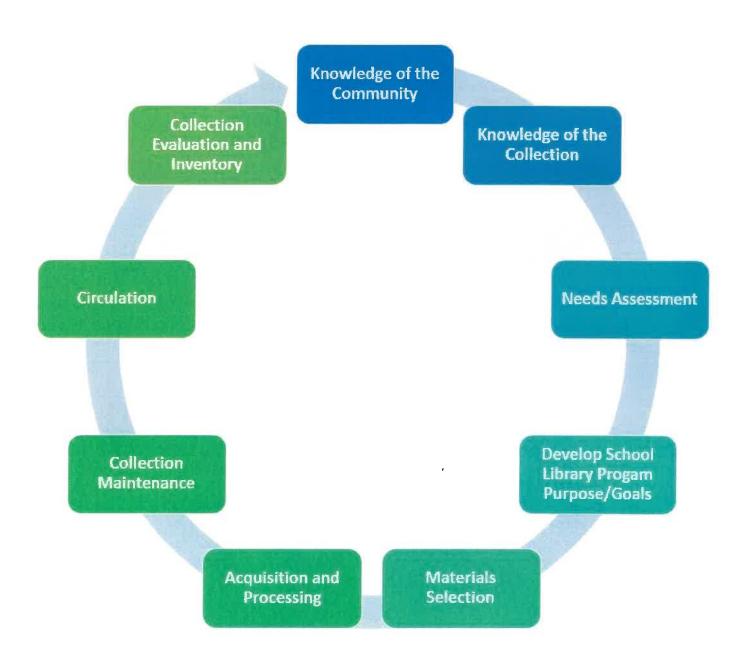






COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT PLAN CYCLE

This collection development plan is a subsection of the J. Michael Conley Elementary (Conley Elementary) Strategic Plan for Library Media Operations. The collection development plan outlines how district and school funds are to be spent, collection maintenance, and how/when to remove items from the collection. The Conley Elementary Collection Development Plan is organized as follows:





KNOWLEDGE OF THE COMMUNITY

Conley Elementary serves 710 students enrolled in grades PreK-5th. The student population ethnicity is made of 11% Hispanic and 89% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 238 White (33%), 412 Black (51.3%), 10 Native (1%), 99 Asian (14%), and 5 Pacific (0.7%).

The administration includes Principal Ben Threadgill, Assistant Principals Ava Williams, and Cara Garrett. Conley Elementary is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Safety Patrols, WCSS News Crew, STEM Club, Robotics Club, Mathletes, Student Council, Spelling Bee, Florida 4-H Public Speaking Contest, and Special Olympics.

KNOWLEDGE OF COLLECTION

Collection Analysis

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Conley Elementary indicates that the average age of the collection is 15 years and the number of books per student is 15.5. The American Association for School Libraries has established a criterion for highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Conley Elementary does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student. The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis.

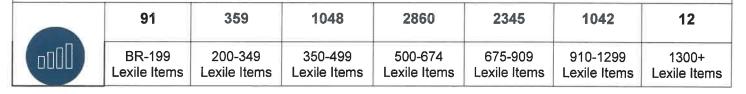

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns

- The number of books per student needs to increase.
- Many categories need an influx of new, current materials.
- Language and Literature appear to be quite dated and need new, updated selections.



Representation Analysis

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints. Circulation will be closely monitored to provide data for the collection development process.

Needs Assessment

Online surveys were made available to staff in August 2024. Parents and students will have access to the survey in the fall of 2024. Elementary school students will be able to complete the survey during their library time. Teachers will be available to read the questions and help with responses for first and second graders if needed. Staff received an email and email reminders to complete their surveys, while the parents will receive the survey through the listsery, teacher newsletters, and online media posts encouraging them to respond. Results from the surveys will be forthcoming. The surveys completed by the staff expressed a need for improved learning opportunities, communication, collaboration, resources, and space. These developed into the goals: 1. Empower students to become self-directed learners through authentic opportunities, 2. Cultivate partnerships, 3. Ensure equitable access to resources and spaces.

Materials Selection

Conley Elementary library media center is under the umbrella of the Leon County Schools district library program which in turn, follows requirements laid out by Florida law for library media centers and instructional materials.

Per <u>FS 1006.28.6(d)2.a-d</u> and LCS <u>po2520</u>, the guidelines below are general standards by which to review and select materials to meet the needs of your students, faculty, and staff.

Materials considered for purchase are selected on the basis of the following criteria. The materials must be:

- at an appropriate readability level and user appeal.
- valid, accurate, objective, up-to-date, and appropriate information

Effort should be made to keep the media current, comprehensive, and include media that reflects rapidly developing instructional technologies.

After analyzing the Conley Elementary library media collection, the following areas have been selected as the primary areas of emphasis for materials selection for the 2024-2025 school year.

- Area 1: Sunshine State Young Readers Award program
- Area 2: Graphic novels and other popular series
- Area 3: Science at all grade levels, with additional emphasis on the lower grade levels

Acquisition, Processing, and Maintenance

Acquisitions Procedures in School Libraries

School Library Acquisitions Procedures

- In selecting learning resources, professional personnel will evaluate available resources and curriculum needs and will consult reputable, professionally prepared aids to selection, and other appropriate sources. The actual resource will be examined whenever possible.
- Recommendations for purchase involve administrators, teachers, students, district personnel, and community members, as appropriate.
- Gift materials shall be judged by the selection criteria and shall be accepted or rejected by those criteria.
- Selection is an ongoing process that should include removing materials that are no longer used or needed, adding materials, and replacing lost and worn materials that still have educational value.

Circulation

Circulation guidelines and procedures for Conley Elementary Procedures for circulation:

- Number of items allowed by grade:
 - o Kindergarten and 1st grade check out one book
 - o 2nd through 5th graders are allowed to check out two books
- Access to the media center:
 - Students are allowed to check out books from 8:45 a.m. until 2:45 p.m. The library is closed from 11:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m.
- Reshelving of the books happens all day and when books are lost, a printed bill will go home with the student.
