 incidence provides evidence that Tom is clever and
 crafty.
- The author states that Abe Lincoln was always reading and that he studies past midnight on most nights. One can infer that he valued education.
- Based on the information in Captain Scott's diary, readers learn that bad weather impeded his attempt to reach the South Pole.
