Students will develop writing skills addressing several modes and methods, including expository, argumentative, personal, and formal, in order to develop an understanding of each.This course is for students below a 3.0 GPA or below a 3 on the FAST ELA who need extra reinforcement of skills needed for success in future English courses and the FAST.	<b>Reading</b> (Text, document, etc.): Students will be expected to engage in shorter readings to supplement the major texts read in class.
