Principal's Corner



Hello leprechaun families! As we wrap up October and the first quarter, I hope you'll take a minute with your children to reflect on just how much teaching and learning has already taken place. Our teachers have been inviting families to attend conferences and share their child's progress. If that feels overwhelming, you're not alone. Lots of families feel unsure about how to have a productive and meaningful conversation regarding such an important topic. Here are a few things you can do beforehand to make the most of your time with the teacher: Keep track of what seems to be difficult for your child and put together a list of specific questions you'd like to ask. We value this opportunity to meet face to face with you to talk about your child, but please know that this does not have to be the only time we talk. You are always welcome to text, email or call to speak with your child's teacher.



Attendance at school is very important. When students arrive late or are picked up before dismissal, teaching and learning are disrupted. It's quite eye opening, when you do the math, that missing just ten minutes a day adds up to nearly 1 ½ weeks of missed instruction in one school year (nearly half a year over the 13 years of schooling). Please make every effort to have your child in school from 8:30-2:50 each day.



Just Take 20 literacy campaign provides families with practical, easy-to-implement activities to add 20 minutes of reading to their day. Research shows that children who read at least 20 minutes a day outside of the classroom do better in school and in life. The Just Take 20 campaign is available free to all Florida families. Improve your child's family support system by building a plan that works for your family on the go, finding those teachable moments to put the activities into practice in your everyday, busy lives! Thank you for encouraging your child to read at home daily. Students who read or are read to for 20 minutes daily are exposed to 1.8 million words each year and research shows that these students score at the 90th percentile on standardized tests.

MARVELOUS MUSIC MOMENTS

Hello KLES Families!! This month we focused on patterns. In Music, we call these patterns, "form." In class, we would listen to a piece of music and analyze whether or not we had heard the section of music before, or if it sounded like something new. It always amazes me how well the students can hear the changes in music.

Here are some happenings in music that you can ask your student about: Kindergarten- We learned about patterns in music. We listened to The William Tell Overture and figured out the pattern. Then we added movement with a parachute.

1st Grade-We also learned about patterns in music. We played a game pretending we were in the movie The Night at the Museum. Some students were artifacts in the museum that came alive at night. The rest of the students were the security guards trying to catch them moving around. We listened to a song called The Fossils while we moved around. The kids really got into their characters.

2nd Grade-We have been learning about patterns while practicing for our show that is later this week. We can't wait to show off all of our BUGS!

3rd Grade-We are continuing to play our recorders. The students should know the notes B, A and G. We will learn everyone's favorite, Hot Cross Buns starting next week.:)

4th Grade- We learned about a special pattern called Rondo. In rondo form, one of the sections keeps coming back. We read The Giving Tree by Shel Silverstein while we listened to Beethoven's Pathetique Sonata. In Beethoven's piece, the A section kept coming back. In the book, the boy keeps coming back. Even though the piece of music and the book were written almost 200 years apart, it's as if they were written for each other.

5th Grade-We learned about a special form called Theme and Variations. These types on songs have a main theme and then there are musical variations on the theme. We read a book called The Name Jar about a new student from Korea. Then we listened to Variations on a Korean Folk Song. While we listened, we filled in the letters of our own names according to what we heard in the music.
